## School Governance Council Responsibilities

Important Reminder: Schools that are piloting the System for Educator Evaluation and Development (SEED) or are participating in the Commissioner's Network must engage their School Governance Councils.

# Districts Piloting the System for Educator Evaluation and Development (SEED):

The Guidelines for Educator Evaluation and the System for Educator Evaluation and Development (SEED), state that "School governance councils shall assist in the development of whole-school surveys, if applicable, in order to encourage alignment with school improvement goals." This applies to both the 5% of a teacher's evaluation that may be based on student feedback, if and when the survey is administered at the whole-school level, AND to the 10% of a teacher's evaluation that may be based on parent feedback. Pilot districts that currently have school governance councils are reminded to ensure that councils are involved in the development of whole-school surveys.

#### Schools in the Commissioner's Network:

State statute requires that the turnaround committee established for schools in the Commissioner's Network shall consult with the School Governance Council regarding the operational and instructional audit, the turnaround plan and monitoring the implementation of the plan. Schools in the Commissioner's Network are reminded to work with their School Governance Council as they plan and implement their reform model.

# Don't Forget... Councils Must Follow the Freedom of Information Act

School Governance Councils, as publically elected bodies, must follow the requirements of the Freedom of Information (FOI) Act.

For example, councils must be sure they are adhering to FOI requirements such as:

- All meetings must be open to the public
- Notice of a meeting must be made public at least one week prior to the meeting date
- The agenda for a meeting must be posted at last 24 hours in advance
- Following the meeting, minutes of the meeting must be posted within seven days (excluding weekends and holidays)

### Test Your "FOI" Knowledge

**Question:** Can School Governance Council members e-mail each other about council business or is that a violation of the Freedom of Information (FOI) Act?

**Answer:** If council members deliberate an issue via e-mail, it could be considered a meeting under the FOI Act. Councils can disseminate information via e-mail but should avoid the conversations and deliberations that should be held in public.
