

2025-26 Accommodations Crosswalk for Connecticut SAT School Day

Introduction

Updated for the 2025-26 school year, this crosswalk is designed to help educators understand the relationship between the College Board accommodation options in SSD Online (SSDOL) and accommodations for the digital Connecticut SAT School Day for students with an Individualized Education Program (IEP) or Section 504 Plan. The crosswalk also shows the connection to corresponding accommodations in the Connecticut Special Education Data System (CT-SEDS) for students with documented plans. Accommodations, including certain language supports for students who are English learners/multilingual learners (ELs/MLs), must be requested by the school/district-assigned SSD Coordinator in SSDOL and approved by the College Board. Although accommodations can be entered in SSDOL early in the school year, the Connecticut designated accommodations window is November 19, 2025 – January 12, 2026. Requests submitted and approved after the deadline may require testing later in the test window.

Although the Connecticut SAT School Day is administered digitally, SSDOL is used for the SAT Suite of assessments & AP exams, which include digital and paper-based formats depending on the assessment. Educator teams should understand the functionality of the universal tools and accommodations available for digital testing to determine which accommodations may be appropriate depending on the student's documented need. Educators are encouraged to review implemented IEP and Section 504 Plans in CT-SEDS in conjunction with existing student accounts in SSDOL early in the school year to ensure student eligibility and documented need. Previously approved accommodations in SSDOL will persist unless a change is made to the student's account. However, only students with an implemented IEP/Section 504 are permitted to take the CT SAT School Day with accommodations. Additionally, some students identified as EL/ML may be eligible to use language supports (e.g., extended time) as approved by the College Board through SSDOL. When considering best practices, educators should arrange time for students to trial their accommodations and assistive technology (AT), if applicable, early in the year using the College Board's digital [Practice Tests on Bluebook](#). This allows SSD Coordinators to make timely accommodation requests/changes within the SSDOL submission window to promote optimal test conditions on test day.

Accommodations for Students with an Active and Implemented Individualized Educator Program and Section 504 Plan

Extended Time

Although the Connecticut SAT School Day is not self-paced, students with approved extended time can end their test early if they believe they had sufficient time to complete the test.

However, all students **must** sit (at a minimum) for the standard time for each module.

- Break times will **not** change (including extra and nutrition breaks). Students must take full break time(s).
- Students approved for multi-day testing will still test over two or more days. Division of sections/days will be the same.
- Students **can** move ahead at the module level once the standard time has expired, including:
 - From one section to the next if ending the second module early.
 - From their final section to submission.

Students **can't** go back once they've moved forward into the next module, even if time remains. The request for More than Double Time for Reading (includes all test sections) or Math Only is extremely rare and reserved for students with the most significant and complex disabilities whose needs are quite specialized. Documentation will be required prior to approval.

Reading/Seeing Text

The College Board's digital platform provides test settings and features that may be enabled for students with various visual accommodation needs. These include the embedded text-to-speech, a screen reader (enabled on the operating system of the student's testing device or assistive technology), assistive technology, zoom, and color contrast.

Text-to-Speech

The text-to-speech (TTS) accommodations listed below are most appropriate for students who need assistance with reading (generally, students with reading/print disabilities) but who can see detailed graphics/images. TTS reads all text and provides short descriptions of graphics. The student should be familiar with using these accommodation regularly during instruction across the curriculum and on district/statewide assessments. Determining the appropriate reader accommodation should be based on the student's documented disability and access needs.

Important! Text-to-Speech for Math Only should only be requested when a student has an IEP/504 Plan that stipulates the use of TTS for Math only and uses it regularly during instruction across the curriculum and on district/statewide assessments. Students will not have TTS enabled for Reading and Writing. **NOTE: This accommodation is not currently in SSDOL - available for selection in December 2025.**

Screen Readers

This accommodation is more appropriate for students with a visual disability who need assistance with seeing detailed graphics or who need navigating from page to page. Determining the appropriate reader accommodation should be determined per the student's disability and access needs. Educator teams should trial the screen reader with the student using the Bluebook Practice Test to determine appropriateness and functionality prior to requesting in SSDOL and well in advance of test day. Check to make sure devices such as headphones are working properly prior to test day.

Important! Screen readers for Math Only should only be requested when a student has an IEP/504 Plan that stipulates the use of Screen Reader for Math only and use it regularly during instruction across the curriculum and on district/statewide assessments. Students will not have screen reader enabled for Reading and Writing. **NOTE: This accommodation is not currently in SSDOL - available for selection in December 2025.**

Large Print Test Booklets

Some students with the most significant visual/print or medical disabilities may test with large print or braille test books if their access needs cannot be met using the digital platform. These must be explicitly requested through the College Board SSD online prior to testing. In instances that zoom (or other accommodations) does not meet the student's print or visual needs, paper testing must be requested in SSDOL by January 12, 2026. Select "Other" and specify in the text field.

Human Reader

A Human Reader **should only** be requested in SSD Online if a student's accessibility needs **cannot be met** through the use of embedded accessibility supports and accommodations. (This accommodation is typically used by students with significant visual, print, or reading disabilities who rely on a human reader to access instruction and district/state assessments.)

A human reader accommodation will require 1:1 digital testing with a proctor who will read the

test to the student from the computer screen and respond for the student on the computer.

The student will receive an exam format enabled with Up to Time and One-Half (+50%), unless double time is needed and requested separately in SSDOL.

Braille

A Braille Test Booklet can be requested in SSD Online if a student’s accessibility needs cannot be met through the use of embedded accessibility supports and accommodations.

Note: If the student cannot test digitally, braille-paper testing should be requested in SSDOL by January 12, 2026.

Students approved for Braille Paper Testing will automatically receive the raised line drawings supplement.

Select “Other” in SSDOL and specify braille code the text field. The College Board provides UEB with Nemeth Math and UEB Technical. This must be requested well in advance of test day. Braille testers will use standard time unless extended time is requested in SSDOL.

Raised Line Drawings

Raised line drawings supplement must is a separate accommodation that CB also supports if the student does not require Braille Paper testing.

Magnification

Students can take the digital exam using their device's functions to zoom in and zoom out (e.g., Ctrl +/- or Command +/-). Universal tools are allowed for all students. Refer to [Bluebook Digital Tools](#) for more information.

Note: In instances where zoom cannot be used with digital testing, request assistive technology AND specify software in SSDOL. Note: The request for AT in SSDOL requires documentation.

Color Contrast

Prior to testing, the color settings and contrast can be adjusted on the student's testing device using the setting configurations. The use of a non-embedded colored overlay must be requested in SSDOL. The school or student must provide the overlay.

Assistive Technology

Students can take a digital exam using approved assistive technology software.

The specific assistive technology (i.e., eye gaze, head wand) or third-party software must be requested in SSDOL. (Note: No need to request a computer or indicate AT if student uses screen Reader e.g., JAWS/NVDA.) The request for AT in SSDOL requires documentation.

Educator teams should trial the screen reader with the student using the Bluebook Practice Test to determine appropriateness and functionality prior to requesting in SSDOL and well in advance of test day.

Recording Answers

Note: If paper testing, the submission of documentation is required in SSDOL and should be requested in SSDOL by January 12, 2026.

Dictation

If the student's needs cannot be met using speech-to-text, a scribe for digital testing should be requested in SSDOL by January 12, 2026.

The scribe accommodation will require 1:1 digital testing with a proctor who will scribe dictated responses from the student onto the digital test (e.g., may be appropriate for students with significant physical disabilities or temporary injury). Note: There is no essay component on the

CT SAT School Day. All items are multiple-choice; therefore, speech-to-text may not be applicable.

Braille Writer

For a digital exam, braille writing software should be used. If a student is unable to test using the digital exam, a braille test booklet can be requested in SSD Online.

Note: Students can access an online copy of the verbal instructions through the Bluebook Help page. To access a printed copy of verbal instructions for paper tests, print instructions for the student from Helpful links in SSDOL.

Note about calculators: A built-in Desmos graphing and scientific calculator is available for the entire Math section of the CT SAT School Day. The calculator is provided in the practice test on Bluebook to allow students to practice using the calculator before the test. Refer to the [SAT Calculator Policy](#) webpage for information about general guidelines and policies regarding handheld calculators. Request the calculator accommodation in SSDOL if it is needed by the student when taking other College Board assessments (e.g., AP).

English Learner/Multilingual Learner (EL/ML) Language Supports that Require Documentation in SSDOL for the CT SAT School Day

EL/ML supports may be used by students who, at the time of testing:

- meet the definition of "English learner/multilingual learner" per state and federal policy as defined in ESSA; and
- use the same support on schoolwork and other assessments, including state assessments.

While students should be provided with supports similar to those used during instruction, some supports, such as extended time, may not be appropriate for all students on a summative assessment. Consult with the school/district EL/ML coordinator or teacher prior to applying for the additional support. It is recommended that a record of this support be maintained in the school so that test proctors and administrators can locate, schedule, and provide the Native Language Reader for Test Directions, if applicable, or other non-embedded language supports such as the College Board Approved Word-to-Word Translation Glossary (if appropriate).

Extended Time

The Connecticut SAT School Day is not self-paced, EL/ML students approved up to time and one-half can end their test early if they believe they had sufficient time to complete the test. However, they **must** sit (at a minimum) for the standard time for each module.

- Break times will **not** change.
- Students **can** move ahead at the module level once the standard time has expired, including:
 - From one section to the next if ending the second module early.
 - From their final section to submission.
- This accommodation must be requested and approved in SSDOL for the student to use this accommodation on the CT SAT School Day.

Text-to-Speech Math Only

The text-to-speech (TTS) for Math only is a language support intended for EL/ML students who use it during instruction. TTS reads all text and provides short descriptions of graphics. The student should be familiar with using this accommodation regularly during instruction across the curriculum and on district/statewide assessments. The TTS for Math only option will be available for selection in SSD Online in early December 2025. It must be requested and approved in SSDOL for the student to use this accommodation on the CT SAT School Day.

Note: If applicable, the accommodations above should be documented in SSDOL for students who do not have an IEP/Section 504 Plan. Otherwise, accommodations should be requested in SSDOL for dually identified EL/ML students with a documented plan if appropriate. Accommodations must be submitted in SSDOL by January 12, 2026.)
