What is the Connecticut Alternate Assessment?

Components of Connecticut's Alternate Assessment System			
Content Area	Alternate Assessment	Grades	
English Language Arts	Connecticut Alternate Assessment (CTAA)	3–8 and 11	
Mathematics	Connecticut Alternate Assessment (CTAA)	3–8 and 11	
Science	Connecticut Alternate Science (CTAS)	5, 8, and 11	
English Language Proficiency	Collaborative for the Alternate Assessment of English Language Proficiency (CAAELP) for students who are dually identified as English learners/multilingual learners (ELs/MLs) with an Individualized Education Plan (IEP) documenting a significant cognitive disability.	K-12	




Which Students Qualify for the Alternate Assessment System?

Using the Connecticut Alternate Assessment System Eligibility Form, the PPT determines student eligibility based on the documented evidence within the Individualized Education program (IEP) of the following three indicators:

- 1. There is evidence of an intellectual impairment based on standardized, cognitive assessments/scores, or in the absence of standardized cognitive assessment data, other documentation that substantiates the presence of an intellectual impairment.
- 2. There are results of adaptive behavior assessment(s) (e.g., with a score more than 1.5 standard deviations below the mean score).
- 3. The student requires intensive instruction and significant supports.





Required Online Training


- Available now on the Connecticut Comprehensive Assessment Program Portal
- Teachers administering the Connecticut Alternate Assessments must have a TEA user role in TIDE
- Includes four training modules and a quiz
- A score of 80% or greater certifies a teacher as trained and grants access to the Data Entry Interface and other secure systems needed to administer the alternate assessments












Critical Dates for Submitting Eligibility Forms




Connecticut Alternate Assessment System Eligibility Form Submission Dates through the Data Entry Interface (DEI)

November 14, 2022 – December 23, 2022

- Students in Grade 11 who qualify for the Alternate Assessment System.
- Students in Grades K-12 who are dually identified as EL/ML and receive services under IDEA who qualify for the CAAELP and/or CTAA/CTAS.



Critical Dates for Submitting Eligibility Forms




November 14, 2022 – March 1, 2023

- Students in Grades 3-8 who qualify for the alternate assessment system
- Any new student in Grade 11 or a newly identified EL/ML who qualifies for the CAAELP and/or CTAA/CTAS.

*Late submissions will only be permitted for those students newly identified for eligibility. In this case, submissions after March 1, 2023, will require the TEA to contact the Connecticut Cambium Assessment Incorporated Help Desk at **844-202-7583** to activate the Alt Flag Indicator. If this does not occur, students will only have access to the standard assessments (Smarter Balanced, NGSS, SAT School Day, and LAS Links Assessments).





Connecticut's CAAELP assessment may also be referenced as Alt ELPA is some resources. For Connecticut's testing purposes these are synonymous. If a Connecticut specific resource is available please consider it first because it includes Connecticut's policies and guidance.

Connecticut Alternate Assessment System

2022-23 Connecticut Alternate Assessment System Early Stopping Rule

Connecticut Alternate Assessments measure the knowledge and skills of students with significant cognitive disabilities as required by the Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) and Every Student Succeeds Act (ESSA). They are designed to support student independence to the greatest extent possible by making academic and language content accessible and the expected achievement levels appropriate. The Connecticut Alternate Assessment System is comprised of the following assessments:

- The Connecticut Alternate Assessment (CTAA)—aligned to the same Connecticut Core Standards (CCS)
 used to instruct and assess all of Connecticut's public-school students in Grades 3-8 and 11 in the
 subject areas of mathematics and English language arts.
- The Connecticut Alternate Science (CTAS) Assessment—aligned to the Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) and administered to students in Grades 5, 8, and 11.
- The Collaborative for the Alternate Assessment of English Language Proficiency (CAAELP)—designed
 for students with significant cognitive disabilities in Grades K-12 who are dually identified as English
 learners/multilingual learners (ELs/MLs) receiving services under IDEA. Content aligned to and derived
 from the Connecticut English Language Proficiency (CELP) standards define the tested domains of
 listening, speaking, reading, and writing.

Connecticut's Alternate Assessments vary in test design, format, and administration procedures. The CTAA and CAAELP are online, while the CTAS is a paper performance task-based assessment. Each assessment may be accessed by the student in various formats as needed. Generally, **students may access the test items by**:

- Listening to the teacher read the test
- Reading the test question independently if the trained teacher determines this is appropriate
- Having the test question signed by a qualified educator
- Listening to the recorded voice read the test question (applicable to the online CTAA only)

Students may respond to test items while the trained teacher records responses by:

- · Verbalizing the answer
- · Gesturing, signing, or pointing to the answer
- Using an eye gaze system to select the answer
- Using assistive technology (AT) to indicate the answer
- Circling or marking the answers on a paper copy of the test for educator transcription



Friendly Reminders

- Complete the required training as soon as possible.
- Submit your student's Connecticut Alternate
 Assessment Eligibility Form in the DEI by the grade and assessment-specific deadline.
- Plan early and administer the CTAS performance tasks as aligned to your curriculum (applicable to eligible students in Grades 5, 8, and 11).
- Refer to the Connecticut Alternate Assessment System Early Stopping Rule guidelines and follow the instructions and deadlines if applicable.
