NGSS and Smarter Balanced Interim Answer Keys Available

Smarter Balanced ELA and Mathematics Interim Assessment Answer Keys and Scoring Guides are available in TIDE, the Centralized Reporting System, or



the Interim Assessment Item Portal in <u>Tools for Teachers</u>. Directions for using this simple feature can be found in <u>Creating an Answer Key Document Using the Interim Assessment Item Portal (IAIP)</u>. The NGSS Interim Answer Keys are available in TIDE as well, and item responses are provided in the Assessment Viewing Application and the Centralized Reporting System.

NGSS Interim Assessment Refresh

The Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS) Interim Assessments aligned to the NGSS Standards will be undergoing a refresh in January 2022. The refresh will add items not currently on the NGSS interims, including shorter stand-alone items and item clusters, as well as improve or replace items with any inconsistencies. Another feature to be added will be scoring rubrics that will make it easier for educators to understand how the item interactions are being scored. PSIS and State Summative Assessments

The Public School Information System (PSIS) provides data to test delivery systems for state summative assessments administered to Connecticut public school students. These assessments include the LAS Links, Next Generation Science Standards (NGSS), Smarter Balanced, Connecticut Alternate Assessment (CTAA) in English language arts and mathematics, Connecticut Alternate Science (CTAS), and the Connecticut SAT School Day. District PSIS Coordinators Unregister" page in the PSIS Registration Module or by must work closely with Testing Coordinators, English Language Assessment Coordinators (ELACs), and SAT Test Coordinators to ensure that student information is being reported accurately. The state relies on districts to provide accurate reporting of PSIS student-level data. Select fields such as English Learner status, Special Education status, and Section 504 status must be updated prior to testing to ensure students eligible for accommodations may access them. Data are used for public/secure reporting of statewide test results and as part of Connecticut's Next Generation Accountability System.

The PSIS Registration module has been updated to include the following Testing Demographic fields:

- Special Education (SPED) Status,
- Free and Reduced Lunch (FRL) Status,
- English Learner (EL) Status,
- Military Family,
- Homeless,
- Recently Arrived EL, and
- Section 504 Status.

These seven values must reflect the student's status at the time of testing for the 2021-22 school year. The SPED, FRL, EL, Military Family, and Homeless have been loaded with the values reported in the October PSIS Collection Freeze Zero file (i.e., freeze file from the collection generated on November 5, 2021). The values for Recently Arrived EL and Section 504 were not pulled from Freeze Zero because these data are not reported in the PSIS October collection. These values have been set to "No" in the Registration Module and must be updated in the PSIS Registration Module for testing and reporting purposes.

Please note, that if the status of any the first five fields changed from the value reported in the October PSIS Collection Freeze Zero, or if the student being tested was not in the PSIS October Collection Freeze Zero, the District PSIS Coordinator must update the student's record in the PSIS Registration Module. Changes to the Testing Demographic data can be made via the "Edit Registration/ batch. The Testing Demographics Record Layout for batch uploads can be found in the PSIS Reference Guide located on the PSIS help site.

District PSIS Coordinators must make all changes to student enrollment and demographic information directly into the PSIS Registration Module. Student demographic values will be saved and the fields will be locked in PSIS on June 3, 2022 (i.e., the last day of the summative testing window), so all changes to a student's status at the time of testing must be made by then. For LAS Links accountability calculations, a freeze of the fields will be taken on March 4, 2022, which is the final date of the LAS Links testing.

The Missing Connecticut Testing Demographic Status Values report is available in PSIS Registration Module, and the Active Roster download has been updated to include the Testing Demographic values. Data from the PSIS Registration Module are updated on a nightly basis in both the Test Information Distribution Engine (TIDE) and DRC's INSIGHT System. Again, these seven fields in the PSIS Registration Module must reflect the student's status at the time of testing.

To enter accommodations in TIDE, students must be identified as Special Education or Section 504 in the PSIS Registration Module. Similarly, for a student to access a LAS Links assessment in the DRC Insight system, a student must be identified as an English learner in the PSIS Registration Module. Additionally, a student may be identified as both an English learner and a student with disabilities, and should be reflected as such in the PSIS testing demographic fields prior to the opening of the LAS Links testing window, January 3, 2022.

Special Populations Updates

2021-22 Connecticut Assessment Guidelines

The <u>2021-22 Assessment Guidelines</u> is the educator's "Go-To" for all things related to universal tools, embedded and non-embedded designated supports and accommodations for Connecticut's Assessment System (Smarter Balanced Assessments, the NGSS, the Connecticut SAT School Day, and the Connecticut Alternate Assessment System). While the Accessibility Chart for <u>Smarter Balanced/NGSS</u> and the <u>Connecticut SAT School Day</u> provides a list of these tools and accommodations, the Assessment Guidelines explains these supports in greater detail. It also explains the process for requesting a Medical Exemption or Special Documented Accommodations.

Change to the Submission Process for the Decision Guidelines for Text-to-Speech of the Smarter Balanced ELA Reading Passages

Effective on November 12, 2021, the submission link to the Decision Guidelines for Text-to-Speech of the Smarter Balanced ELA Reading Passages was deactivated and this data will no longer be reported to the Connecticut State Department of Education. However, the Decision Guidelines for Text-to-Speech remains a critical document intended to be completed at the Planning and Placement Team or 504 Planning meetings to determine eligibility for certain students with a visual or print disability using this accommodation during instruction. The form should be used locally and maintained with the student's record. Given the change to the submission process, the Decision Guidelines and associated resources have been updated on the portal to capture the revised procedures.

Connecticut Alternate Assessment Eligibility Form

The Connecticut Alternate Assessment Eligibility Form is used by the PPT to determine eligibility for Connecticut's Alternate Assessment System. Eligibility requires that students meet three important criteria:

- Evidence of an intellectual impairment based on standardized, cognitive assessments/scores, or in the absence of standardized cognitive assessment data, other information that substantiates the presence of an intellectual impairment.
- Results of adaptive behavior assessment(s) (e.g., scored more than 1.5 standard deviations below average).
- Student requires intensive instruction and significant supports.

Once approved, eligibility forms are submitted into the DEI by the TEA to register the student to participate in the Alternate Assessments. The submission window for the DEI is November 19, 2021—June 3, 2022.

<u>The Connecticut Alternate Assessment System Training</u>—Required for Teachers Administering the Alternate (TEAs) for the 2021-2022 school year is available. The training course link, along with all other relevant training resources, can be found on the Alternate Assessment webpage located on the <u>Connecticut Comprehensive Assessment Program Portal</u>.

The **Smarter Balanced Ecosystem Course** is a self-paced course available at no cost to Connecticut educators. It gives educators the opportunity to learn about the Smarter Balanced system of tools and resources. The course includes videos, annotated note-taking guides, and even a scavenger hunt that challenges the user to find specific professional learning resources in the Tools for Teachers website. The course takes about two hours to complete. Participants will receive a certificate of completion after successfully passing the embedded quizzes.
