

Need Help Reading or Marking Your Ballot?

Ask For: The IVS Device



What is it? The Integrated Voting Systems (IVS) ballot marking device is an accessible, in-person, alternative to pen and paper ballots.

Accommodates Voters With:

- Restricted mobility
- Limited fine motor skills
- Low vision or blindness

How Does it Work?

- You can vote by: touchscreen display, audio navigation with tactile keys and headset, connecting your Sip-n-Puff, or requesting a button switch.
- You can review and revise your choices.



Where is it Available? All polling places and early voting locations. Although not required, you can help your town prepare by telling your Registrar of Voters in advance that you may want to use the IVS device.

How is my Vote Kept Private?

- While voting, poll workers must remain in a location that prevents them from seeing your choices.
- After voting, place your printed ballot in the provided privacy sleeve, then bring it to the tabulator like any other ballot.
