Here are the some of the issues local officials and boards deal with:

- › Neighborhood concerns such as education, traffic and noise
- › Road and sidewalk repair, street sweeping and beach cleaning
- › Setting property tax rates
- › Transportation and programs for senior citizens and persons with disabilities
- › Maintenance, cleaning and monitoring of public parks, playgrounds and sports fields
- › Buying equipment and training for police and fire departments

Positions which may be up for election, depending on your location, in odd-numbered years:

Mayor or First Selectman
Town/City Council, Aldermen or Selectmen
Town Clerk
Constables
Board of Finance
Board of Education
Board of Assessment Appeals
Planning + Zoning Board

Why Should You Care About State and Federal Elections?

State officials work on issues such as:

- › Gun violence prevention
- › Benefits to veterans
- › Elections and ballot access
- › Affordable health care and prescription drug pricing
- › Public transportation

Federal officials work on broad issues such as:

- › Foreign policy, national defense and declaring war
- › Medicare and social security
- › Funding given to each state for infrastructure, public education and Medicaid
