In the Meantime.... for Students and Families

There are many things you can do before your first meeting about employment with your DDS Case Manager and/or Transition Coordinator. Review the checklist below and begin gathering information to prepare.

- Review information on employment on the DDS website. This will help you understand the kinds of employment services and supports that are available.

- Get your school records including your special education records. Person centered planning, vocational profiles, interest inventories, and relevant transition assessment will be helpful in discussing your employment goals and vision. Include your IEP and employment objectives. Include your Summary of Performance, if applicable.
- □ List your work experience, volunteer or paid job history. It is important to share all the experiences you have had and any information on what you did, what you liked, and what you did not like. Bring a resume and any letters of recommendation that you might have.
- □ Use the manual **Building a Bridge** available at the CT State Department of Education website. Use the checklists and information to begin to plan early and explore your options. Check out the other resources and directories also available at this site.
