

On July 4, 1776, the Second Continental Congress unanimously adopted the Declaration of Independence, announcing the colonies' separation from Great Britain. The Declaration of Independence's assertion "all Men are created equal," is beloved and often quoted by the American people. Philadelphians marked the first anniversary of American independence with a spontaneous celebration, which is described in a letter by John Adams to his daughter, Abigail. However, observing Independence Day only became commonplace after the War of 1812. In 1859, the Banneker Institute of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, urged African Americans to celebrate Independence Day while bearing witness to the inconsistencies between the ideals espoused in the Declaration of Independence and the practice of slavery. Chairman of the meeting, Mr. Jacob C. White Jr., also promised his audience a brighter future:

"We have learned by experience and by the comparison of ourselves with people similarly situated, to hope that, at someday not very far in futurity, our grievances will be redressed, that our long lost rights will be restored to us, and that, in the full stature of men, we will stand up, and with our once cruel opponents and oppressors rejoice in the Declaration of our common country, and hail with them the approach of the glorious natal day of the Great Republic".

By the 1870s, the Fourth of July was the most important secular holiday on the calendar. Congress passed a law-making Independence Day a federal holiday on June 28, 1870. (source: Library of Congress.gov)



World Population Day, which seeks to focus attention on the urgency and importance of population issues, was established by the then-Governing Council of the United Nations Development Programme in 1989, an outgrowth of the interest generated by the Day of Five Billion, which was observed on 11 July 1987. 






The world's population reached 7 billion on 31






# What is the Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA)?

The Americans with Disabilities Act (ADA) became law in 1990. The ADA is a civil rights law that prohibits discrimination against individuals with disabilities in all areas of public life, including jobs, schools, transportation, and all public and private places that are open to the general public. The purpose of the law is to make sure that people with disabilities have the same rights and opportunities as everyone else. The ADA gives civil rights protections to individuals with disabilities similar to those provided to individuals on the basis of race, color, sex, national origin, age, and religion. It guarantees equal opportunity for individuals with disabilities in public accommodations, employment, transportation, state and local government services, and telecommunications. The ADA is divided into five titles (or sections) that relate to different areas of public life.

In 2008, the Americans with Disabilities Act Amendments Act (ADAAA) was signed into law and became effective on January 1, 2009. The ADAAA made a number of significant changes to the definition of "disability." The changes in the definition of disability in the ADAAA apply to all titles of the ADA, including Title I (employment practices of private employers with 15 or more employees, state and local governments, employment agencies, labor unions, agents of the employer and joint management labor committees); Title II (programs and activities of state and local government entities); and Title III (private entities that are considered places of public accommodation).

According to the NCD's "2020 Progress **Report on National Disability Policy:** Increasing Disability Employment," nearly two-thirds of the 22 million working-age Americans with disabilities have been left out of the labor market. And those that are actively looking for work, experience an unemployment rate twice that of workers without disabilities.

The underlying causes of underemployment in the disability community varies, is complex, and extends well beyond the limits of the ADA. For instance, stereotypes that people with disabilities don't belong in the workplace or are incapable of contributing still linger.



The American disability movement began in earnest in the 1960s With grassroots efforts to resist the centuries old notion that its members were defective and lacking and needed to be segregated from





Thurgood Marshall.



Thurgood Marshall was born on July 2, 1908, to his parents Norma and William Canfield Marshall. His mom worked at an elementary school and his father had various jobs like a waiter in a hotel. Marshall attended Lincoln University and Howard University School of Law. He was the Supreme Court's first African American Justice. In 1961 President John F. Kennedy appointed Marshall to the U.S. Court of Appeals. He was an attorney who fought for civil rights, leading the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP) Legal Defense. He was nominated by Lyndon B. Johnson to the Supreme Court in 1967 and served until his retirement in 1991.












Thurgood Marshall passed away on January 24, 1993. He was truly an icon of diversity, equity, and inclusion.

### **INGREDIENTS**

2 MEDIUM ONIONS, CHOPPED

4 SERRANO CHILES, CHOPPED

4 TBSP BUTTER

3 MEDIUM TOMATOES, PEELED, SEEDED AND CHOPPED

SALT, TO TASTE

PEPPER, TO TASTE

I LB SHRIMP, COOKED

24 TORTILLAS

#### **DIRECTIONS**

Sauté onion and chiles in butter until onion becomes translucent.

Add tomatoes with salt and pepper, to taste.

Cook for 10 minutes, until the tomatoes are thoroughly cooked. If the sauce becomes too thick, thin it with chicken broth or water.

Add the precooked shrimp and saute for 2 minutes, just until they are heated through.

Fill the tortillas with the shrimp mixture and serve piping hot.

Ingredients (Serves 20)
60ML (2 OUNCES) OLIVE OIL

4 onions, Chopped 30ML (1 ounce) crushed garlic and ginger mixture

2.5KG (5.5 LBS) BUTTERNUT, SKINNED, SEEDED AND CUBED

10ML (2 TEASPOONS) MILD CURRY POWDER (MORE OR LESS TO TASTE)
3 LITRES (12 CUP) CHICKEN STOCK
17 5/8 CUPS CREAM
SALT AND WHITE PEPPER TO TASTE

#### **DIRECTIONS**

In a large pot sauté, the oil, onion, garlic, and ginger.

Add the Butternut, curry powder. Mix well and allow to gently fry for two minutes then add the stock.

Cover and simmer gently for about 25 minutes until the vegetables are tender.

Purée the soup. Season to taste. Blend in the cream and gently reheat.


