#### I. Call to Order

The meeting was called to order by Vice Chair Jody Hill-Lilly, who highlighted recent achievements in pay equity and accessibility to education. Despite progress, women remain underrepresented in various sectors.

# II. Report from Council Leadership

# III. Presentation: Hannah Weissman, Code.org

**Topic:** Proposal to Fund Computer Science Education in Connecticut

- Code.org is a national nonprofit offering K-12 coding curriculum, professional learning, and advocacy for computer science education.
- Key Points:
- Computer science is a foundational skill, impacting problem-solving, academic performance, and college attendance.
- Connecticut has over 5,000 open computing jobs per month, with an average salary of \$112,526.

- Only 8.5% of CT students enroll in computer science courses despite 84% of high schools offering them.
- Enrollment disparities exist; young men are 2.3x more likely than young women to take CS courses; Black students are 1.3x less likely than their White and Asian peers.
- Unlike neighboring states (NY, RI, MS, NJ), Connecticut has not allocated state-level funding for computer science education.
- Legislative Ask: Support Bill No. 852, "AN ACT CONCERNING FUNDING FOR COMPUTER SCIENCE TEACHER PROFESSIONAL DEVELOPMENT."

#### Q&A:

- Middle School CS Education: Data collection is limited, but early exposure is crucial.
- **Urgency in Policy Implementation:** The longer action is delayed, the more years are lost in implementation.
- International Comparison: Countries like Thailand, South Korea, Brazil, and China require CS education for graduation, and many allocate significant funding.
- CT's Existing CS Dashboard: Tracks CS availability and participation in grades 9-12, providing a strong foundation for expansion.
- Lieutenant Governor's Computing Challenge: A state initiative promoting computer science learning through competitions and modules, culminating in a May event.

## IV. Presentation: State Representative Corey Paris

**Topic**: The Effects of Student Loan Debt on Women and Girls

- Women, particularly minorities, carry disproportionate student debt burdens, limiting financial independence.
- Minority borrowers pay off debt at slower rates; white men repay 90% of their loans within a decade, while minority borrowers pay off only 10%.

#### • Connecticut Student Loan Statistics:

- o 500,000 borrowers, with an average debt of \$35,000–\$45,000.
- Connecticut has the 5th highest student debt burden in the U.S., totaling \$18.7 billion.

#### • State-Level Solution: Student Loan Reimbursement Program (SLRP)

- Eligibility: CT residents who attended college/trade school in CT, lived in-state for 5 years, and worked in CT for 2 years.
- Program Benefits: Borrowers making a \$5,000 payment can receive a \$5,000 reimbursement (up to \$20,000 over 4 years).
  - o Goal: Redirect savings toward homeownership, childcare, and economic growth.

#### **Q&A**:

- **How to Apply**: The Office of Higher Education administers the program. Applications are available online.
- **Biden Administration's Loan Forgiveness Impact**: While 35 million people received relief, only 14,000 CT residents have benefited thus far.
