Happy 30th Anniversary! 1994-2024

Where were you 30 years ago? Do you remember the 1989–1991 measles outbreak? Sadly, 89 children lost their lives to the sudden and devastating measles outbreak that swept the U.S. between 1989–1991. That outbreak resulted in 27,600 measles cases. That outbreak identified a nationwide need for tracking immunizations, generating population-based coverage analytics, providing access to free vaccines, and outreach and education. That measles outbreak was the catalyst for federal funding from the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) to establish the infrastructure of Immunization Information Systems (IIS), the Vaccines for Children (VFC) program, and Immunization Action Plan (IAP), and over the last 3 decades immunization programs have modernized these systems and programs.

CT WiZ

Since 1994, State law established the Immunization Information Systems (IIS), now called CT WiZ. Initially, vaccines were recorded for children living in Hartford only, but by 1998, had expanded to statewide for all preschool age children. By 2022, reporting of all vaccine doses administered was mandated for people of all ages

living in CT. This expansion was made possible through electronic reporting to CT WiZ.

- Since 2021, the CT WiZ Public Portal allows individuals vaccinated in Connecticut to access their own, or parents to access their minor child's immunization records. CT WiZ meets accessibility standards and is available in English and Spanish. Nearly half a million people have accessed their records!
- CT WiZ has secure IIS to IIS exchange with 14 other IISs and 2 federal partners, and continues to establish connections to help ensure complete records.
- CT WiZ coverage rates are available on the Open Data Portal and by request. This was especially crucial during the pandemic.
- CT WiZ meets national standard requirements for tracking and administration of immunizations in a public health setting.

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

CVP/VFC


- The national Vaccines for Children (VFC) program helps ensure all children have a better chance at getting their recommended vaccines by providing vaccines at no cost to children who might not otherwise be vaccinated because of inability to pay. In Connecticut, this program is called the Connecticut Vaccine Program (CVP).

IAP

- The Immunization Action Plan (IAP) are contracts awarded by the Department of Public Health (DPH) Immunization Program that operate mostly in local health departments/districts in areas at risk of low immunization rates, with the goal of raising childhood immunization rates through outreach, education, and community and local partnerships.
- Connecticut's IAP was launched in 1993.
- The IAP covers a large portion of the state. Of children born in Connecticut in 2020, 62% reside in a town that is covered by an IAP! (See the colored towns on the map below!)

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Provider Spotlight

Southwest Community Health Center

Southwest Community Health Center (CHC) is dedicated to providing high quality, accessible medical, dental and behavioral health services to individuals and families in the Greater Bridgeport area. They provide vital healthcare access for the uninsured, medically underserved residents of Southwest Bridgeport community. Southwest CHC has four clinics that serve the pediatric population and seven School-Based Health Centers. Ensuring their patients are protected with all age-appropriate recommended immunizations has always been very important to Southwest CHC. Southwest CHC has always had relatively high immunization rates among their practices, but the COVID-19 pandemic hindered their rates.

Howard Smith, Southwest CHC's Chief of Pediatrics, along with other organization leadership, such as Kristina Colon, Infection Prevention & Vaccine Manager, and Arlene Higgins, Director of Nursing, decided to focus one of their quality improvement metrics on immunizations to help their rates recover from the COVID-19 pandemic. As a result, they implemented an immunization challenge among all their Southwest CHC pediatric sites to see who could administer the most vaccines. Patients aged 2–18 years were the focus of this challenge, but all ages within the pediatric spectrum were included.

The four main pediatric sites met and reported out weekly to see who was in the lead. The Southwest CHC school-based health centers even got in on the fun and participated in the immunization challenge! The weekly meeting time was also utilized to bounce ideas off one another and discuss any successes or challenges they were experiencing.

★ Utilizing a combination of reports from their electronic health record (EHR) and CT WiZ, they determined which patients were due or overdue for vaccines and would call to get them in and up to date as soon as possible.
★ There were challenges due to time limitations and staffing, but the greatest success of this initiative was attributed to having an immunization champion identified to take the lead at each site. The champions were able to ignite a fire amongst the team, making this truly a fun, engaging team effort from the leadership to the office staff!

Their pediatric immunization rates (for all ACIP recommended vaccines excluding influenza and COVID-19) sitewide started at 45% and have increased to 63% with an upward trajectory. The goal they have set is to reach 75% coverage by the end of summer 2024.

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### **Data Quality Corner**

#### IMPORTANT: How to Report a Cyberthreat/Incident to Ensure Security

Security is a top priority. CT WiZ interfaces are continuously monitored to ensure security of data. CT WiZ has *not* experienced any threats or incidents, but we are being proactive.

### PLEASE FOLLOW 3 STEPS (Alert, Stop, Resume):

If your facility has onboarded or has user access to CT WiZ and experiences a cyberthreat or incident, please take immediate steps to ensure security of CT WiZ data as below:

- Alert –Submit a Helpdesk ticket, select Immunizations (CT WiZ) select category: 'Cyberthreat/Incident' topic: 'Reporting a Threat/Incident' topic: 'Reporting Resolution of Threat/Incident'. Or call (860) 509-7929. Provide as much information as you can including: the date it started, which system was involved, your contact information, and the date it was resolved.
- 2. Stop CT WiZ team will temporarily stop your access to CT WiZ (HL7 and UI) to proactively prevent any user interface (UI) access or (HL7) query to CT WiZ. If you need to request an immunization record in the interim, call (860) 509-7929. Patients may continue to access the CT WiZ Public Portal.
- 3. Resume After you notify the CT WiZ team that your facility's threat/incident has resolved, your staff can then resume user access after we enable password reset. We will also then reactivate HL7 facility codes for your HL7 reporting/query. CT WiZ team will provide additional support as needed.

#### **Updating Data Code Sets in your EHRs**

Have you subscribed to receive email updates from the IIS Data Code Sets | CDC webpage?

- This enables you to keep your electronic health record (EHR) system updated (as new vaccine codes are added) and to ensure accurate reporting to CT WiZ.
