Dear Mr. Zimmer:

Your letter was received by me on 9/8/08 detailing the effects of your project on the two listed species; the state threatened species, Tidewster mucket (Leptodes ochraces) and a species of special concern; Eastern Box Turtle (Terrapene carolina).

Since you indicate that there will be no in-water work or riverbank work: the DEP Wildlife Divison concurs with your assessment that the Tidewater mucket will not be impacted by this project.

The Wildlife Division agrees with your recommendations to avoid impacts to Eastern Box Turtles, namely:

- to hire an environmental inspector to conduct daily surveys during the turtle's active season (April
   October), identify and relocate any turtles located within the project workspace out of harm's
  way but to keep them as close to the area that they were found in as this species has a relatively
  small home range.
- to educate contractors about the identification of box turties and the actions they should take when one is encountered.
- 3. to place box turtle educational signs along the limits of the workspace.

Enclosed is a copy of the DEP Natural Diversity Database Special Animal Survey Form. The information required on this form, along with a photo of the turtle, will be all that is necessary for data collection.

Unless your environmental inspector is conducting a long-term study on Eastern box turties, marking of turties is not recommended. In cases where marking is being performed a scientific collectors permit is required for all activities that involve capture, marking, salvage or release or disturbance of a protected wildlife species. Standard protocols for the protection of wetlands should be followed and maintained during the course of the project. Additionally, all slit fencing should be removed after soils are stable so that reptile and amphibian movement between uplands and wetlands is not restricted.
