At your request, All-Points Technology Corporation, P.C. ("APT") is performing an evaluation with respect to possible state and federally-listed, threatened or endangered species in order to determine if the proposed telecommunications facility at the referenced property would result in a potential adverse effect to species of concern.

No federally-listed endangered or threatened species are known to occur in the Town of Orange, Connecticut according to the list of federally endangered and threatened species in Connecticut maintained by the United States Department of the Interior Fish and Wildlife Service (USFWS) New England Field Office (refer to the attached listing, dated July 31, 2008, the most recent update). As such it is our opinion that the proposed development would not result in an adverse effect to any federally-listed endangered or threatened species.

In further support of this preliminary finding, APT reviewed the Connecticut Department of Energy & Environmental Protect ("CTDEEP") Natural Diversity Data Base ("NDDB") State and Federal Listed Species and Significant Natural Communities Map for the project area (attached herein) and determined that no potential conflicts exist with species of concern. Although not required based on the results of the NDDB map review, APT has submitted a request for rare species review by the Department for written confirmation.

Since no federally-listed endangered or threatened species are known to occur in Orange and the CTDEEP NDDB does not identify any potential conflicts, it is our opinion that the proposed development would not result in an adverse effect to any state or federally-listed endangered or threatened species. We are waiting for concurrence from the CTDEEP with respect to this preliminary determination and will forward appropriate correspondence upon receipt.




